

## From St. Peter's Square

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This Sunday's Gospel passage shows us, so to speak, the "passing of the baton" from John the Baptist to Jesus. John was His precursor; he prepared the terrain for Him and he prepared the way for Him: Jesus can now begin his mission and announce the salvation by now present; He was the salvation. His preaching is summarized in these words: "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent, and believe in the gospel." Simply. Jesus did not mince words. It is a message that invites us to reflect on two essential themes: time and conversion.

In this text of Mark the Evangelist, time is to be understood as the duration of the history of salvation worked by God; therefore, the time "fulfilled" is that in which this salvific action reaches its pinnacle, full realization: it is the historical moment in which God sent his Son into the world and his Kingdom was rendered more "close" than ever. The time of salvation was fulfilled because Jesus arrived. However, salvation is not automatic; salvation is a gift of love and as such, it is offered to human freedom. Always, when we speak of love, we speak of freedom: love without freedom is not love; it may be interest, it may be fear, many things, but love is always free, and being free it calls for a freely given response: it calls for our conversion. Thus, it means changing mentality — this is conversion, changing mentality — and changing life: no longer following the examples of the world but those of God, who is Jesus; following Jesus; "doing" as Jesus had done, and as Jesus taught us. It is a decisive change of view and attitude. In fact, sin — above all the sin of worldliness which is like air, it permeates everything — brought about a mentality that tends toward the affirmation of oneself against others and against God. This is curious... What is your identity? And so often we hear that one's identity is expressed in terms of "opposition". It is difficult to express one's identity in the worldly spirit, in positive terms and in those of salvation: it is against oneself, against others and against God. And for this purpose it does not hesitate — the mentality of sin, the worldly mentality — to use deceit and violence. Deceit and violence. We see what happens with deceit and violence: greed, desire for power and not service, war, exploitation of people... This is the mentality of deceit that definitely has its origins in the father of deceit, the great pretender, the devil.


#### LITURGICAL ITEMS

Chalice Items: The Purificator

The purificator is a rectangular white linen folded 3 times length-wise and draped over the opening of the Chalice. At first glance, it may seem like an unassuming piece of cloth, but it is very sacred object. Purificators are primarily used to clean and dry the inside of the Chalice, along with with the edge of any Chalices used to distribute Holy Communion. They also are used to dry the priests fingers and lips, as well as the fingers of the Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, since they may have particles of the Eucharist on their hands.

Because purificators may have particles of the Blessed Sacrament (both under the appearance of bread and wine), the Sacristan (a person who takes care of the sacred vessels and linens before and after Mass), must use special procedures to wash them to avoid defiling the Body of the Lord, Purificators should not be used at more than one Mass between washings.

Fresh purificators (those properly cleaned after being used at Mass) are also used during the veneration of the cross at the Good Friday liturgy, the veneration of relics, underneath the monstrance during Exposition and sometimes as a lavabo towel.

"Where two or three meet together in my name, I shall be there with them." -Matthew 18.20-




A non-Christian woman who did not believe the true Catholic dogma of the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, aided by some of her Christian friends, managed to steal a consecrated Host during the celebration of a Sacred Mass. The woman, as if daring God, put the consecrated Host into a frying pan of oil. Suddenly the Host spilled out masses of Blood, which poured to the floor and out the door of the house.












o this day in Trani, Puglia, the relic of this miracle which happened around the year one thousand, is housed in the Cathedral of Holy Mary of the Assumption. There are numerous documents which retell this miracle; among them are Eucharistic monograms, which are on the ancient streets of the city. Brother Bartolomeo Campi describes in his work, "L'Inamorato di Gesù Cristo" (1625), an accurate account of the unfolding of the facts: "Pretending to be Christian, the woman received Communion with the others... and took the consecrated Host from her mouth and transferred the Holy Eucharist to a handkerchief. Once home she wanted to experiment with whether or not the Blessed Sacrament was bread and put the consecrated Host into a heated frying pan filled with oil. Upon contact with the boiling oil, the consecrated

Host miraculously became Bloody Flesh and a hemorrhage, so to speak, would not stop flowing and went from the pan all over the cursed woman and her house. Terrorized, the woman began to scream... and the neighbors ran over to find out the reasons behind her cries...".

The archbishop was immediately informed of the events and he ordered the return of the consecrated Host to the church. That same Cistercian Abbot Ferdinando Ughelli (1670), in his well-known encyclopedic work "Italia Sacra", wrote in a notation of his seventh volume: "In Trani a sacred Host was fried to the dismay of our Faith..., the true Flesh and Blood of Christ was unveiled in the unleavened Bread which fell to the ground". An indirect confirmation to this miracle is also

found in the affirmation of St. Pio from Pietreclina, which exclaimed: "Trani is fortunate to have been bathed by the Blood of Christ twice", the first reference being to this miracle and the later to the miracle of the Colonna Crucifix from which an abundant stream of blood flowed from Jesus' nose. Thanks to the generosity of the nobleman Ottavian Campitelli, the house of the woman was converted into a chapel in 1706. In 1616 the relic of the Host was transferred to an antique silver shrine donated by Fabrizio de Cunio. Throughout various eras, many tests were performed on this sacred relic and verified, the last one took place in 1924 at the Inter-diocesan Eucharistic Congress headed by Monsignor Giuseppe Maria Leo.


# SUPPORT THE Solidarity Fund for the CHURCH IN AFRICA

A solid foundation in financial management and recordkeeping helps pastors build trust in the local church and use limited financial resources with transparency and responsibility.

Recognizing this need, the Solidarity Fund for the Church in Africa supports episcopal conferences' efforts to train pastors, administrators, and financial staff in budgeting, management, and procedures to improve transparency and accountability. A Solidarity Fund grant to the National Episcopal Conference of Cameroon helped the Diocese of Ngaoundéré train 136 members of 29 parish councils in these skills, empowering them to manage financial matters with competence and reliability. The Solidarity Fund also granted funds to the National Episcopal Conference of Congo (in the Democratic Republic of Congo) to conduct financial management training for 121 diocesan and parish staff from the Diocese of Buta. Through this training, the diocese has prepared diocesan clergy and parish staff to manage development projects, social ministries, and parish resources, thereby becoming better and more effective ministers to those they serve.
