From the Desk of Fr. Vasek

Greetings,

I hope your Lenten journey is uniting you to the love of God revealed to us in Christ Jesus. Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are meant to be daily ways of joining Jesus in the desert, preparing us to celebrate anew the marvel of our redemption. May each week of Lent draw you further in your preparation. Here is a short liturgical summary of these great feasts.

At the summit of the Church year, the three great days of the Easter Triduum encompass the Paschal Mystery and draw us into the Passion, death and Resurrection of Jesus our Savior. With his disciples, we enter the upper room to celebrate the Passover. We accompany him to watch at his agony in Gethsemane, and then we follow him through the halls of judgment to his bitter Passion. We take his way of sorrow that leads to Calvary and death on a cross. Then we assist at his burial in the rock tomb. We wait in solemn vigil until he rises again, in our human flesh, glorious and immortal. So we look in hope to our compassionate High Priest returning to the Father and taking us to glory with him in his Mystical Body, the Church. – from "Ceremonies of the Liturgical Year" by Bishop Peter Elliott


Dinner begins at 5:45 PM in the parish hall and preaching begins at 6:30 PM in the Church. All are invited.

St. Bernard's Adoration Society

We continue to be blessed with new adorers signing up for Eucharistic Adoration. We anticipate being able to open up at least one additional block of Adoration before the end of Lent.

As we open up more blocks of Adoration, the Adoration Society is in need of volunteers to take on leadership roles in 2 main capacities.

- 1. We need a team of individuals to help manage the schedule of adorers: recruiting to fill empty blocks and coordinate substitutes.
- 2. We need individuals to serve as Eucharistic Ministers who can expose and repose the Blessed Sacrament at the beginning and end of our open blocks. This role is vital for sustaining Perpetual Adoration until all hours of Adoration are filled. Proper training will be provided for this important ministry.



LITURGICAL ITEMS

Sanctuary: The Ambo

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) states: "When the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself speaks to his people, and Christ, present in his word, proclaims the Gospel." During Mass, the ambo is where this proclamation takes place. It is not just a desk for holding the Lectionary, but signifies the living and effective nature of the word of God. The word *ambo* comes from the Greek, meaning *a rim or raised area*.

One of the earliest uses of the term in a liturgical context was in the 4th Century at the Council of Laodicea. Ambos grew in popularity from then, coming into universal use by the 9th Century. The 12th Century saw them reach their full development with high artistic beauty. From then their use gradually waned, and the Scripture at Mass was eventually read quietly from a stand on the altar. Ambos were replaced by pulpits, a similar furnishing where the priest would preach his homily.

In the 20th Century, a desire developed of to restore the proclamation of Scripture to a prominent place in the liturgy. In the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy of the Second Vatican Council, the venerable tradition of the liturgical proclamation of Scripture was re-established, and the use of the ambo restored.

The GIRM regulates the use the ambo: "From the ambo only the readings, the responsorial psalm, and the Easter Proclamation (Exultet) are to be proclaimed; it may be used also for giving the homily and for announcing the intentions of the Prayer of the Faithful."

The Eucharistic miracle of Silla happened in 1907. Some Hosts, stolen by unknown thieves, were recovered in perfect condition and were hidden under a stone in a little garden not far from the city. Even today it is possible to adore the miraculous Hosts: they remain intact







since almost one hundred years ago. The Hosts are preserved in the church of Our Lady of the Angels in Silla. Still today it is possible to adore the uncorrupted Hosts preserved in the church of this town at the outskirts of Valencia.

WORK OF MERCY: Instruct the Ignorant

THE GRACE I SEEK: to wholeheartedly worship God alone

IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER, AND OF THE SON, AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT. AMEN.

Pause for a few moments, and allow yourself to become aware of Jesus' gift of himself in the Eucharist. Realize that, at this very moment, the Lord of Life is gazing upon you with great love. Allow yourself to receive his loving gaze. You are his beloved child. Rest in his loving gaze.

Thank Jesus for the gift of himself in the Eucharist.

ASK FOR THE GRACE: Jesus, help me to seek you with a sincere, repentant heart that trusts totally in your redeeming love.

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you through this passage.

"You shall not have other gods beside me. You shall not make for yourself an idol or a likeness of anything in the heavens above or on the earth below or in the waters beneath the earth; you shall not bow down before them or serve them." (Exodus 20:3–5a)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.

What other "gods" might be occupying the place in my heart that truly belongs to the Lord, distracting me from growing in my relationship with God and understanding my faith? These could be things such as entertainment, possessions, relationships, or honors. What concrete choices can I make to set aside time to attend Mass more frequently and/or spend time with our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament during this Lenten Season in order to deepen my relationship with him?

SCRIPTURE MEDITATION — Read slowly, 3–4 times. Again, allow the words of Scripture to wash over your mind and heart. Let the Holy Spirit speak to you through this passage.

"Since the Passover of the Jews was near, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. He found in the temple area those who sold oxen, sheep, and doves, as well as the money changers seated there. He made a whip out of cords and drove them all out of the temple area...'Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace.'" (John 2:13–16)

REFLECTION QUESTION — Allow yourself to sit with these questions for a while, being attentive to how the Lord is speaking in your heart.


How may God be calling me to cleanse the temple of my heart during this Lenten Season? What worries or preoccupations might I be able to entrust to God today?

Remain in silence with the Lord. Allow him to speak in the silence, in your heart. Receive his presence. If it helps, write down what you sense the Lord communicating to you during this time of prayer.

CLOSING PRAYER — O God, author of every mercy and of all goodness, who in fasting, prayer and almsgiving have shown us a remedy for sin, look graciously on this confession of our lowliness, that we, who are bowed down by our conscience, may always be lifted up by your mercy. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen. (Collect, Third Sunday of Lent)

SUNDAY MASS CONNECTION — At every Mass, Jesus offers himself to the Father for us. We can always join our own offerings with Jesus at Mass. This Sunday, offer something in your heart that is keeping you from growing closer to God. Ask for the grace of surrender so that you can grow in true freedom and joy!

LOVE IN ACTION — Many people struggle to understand our Catholic faith. This week, ask the Holy Spirit to help you identify a person in your life who is struggling in his or her faith. Reach out with a word of encouragement and an offer to chat with him or her so that they can learn and grow more confident in the faith.
