

From the Desk of Fr. Vasek

Greetings,

One of the central ministry commitments of St. Bernard's is its school. Since 1925, Catholic education has been an essential extension of parish life. Catholic Schools Week is a great week to highlight and honor the gift of a Catholic education. I got a burger in town this past week, and a young man said to me: "Hey, I went to St. Bernard's school, and I'm going to send my kids to St. Bernard's. It's the best!" That is very edifying to hear. We welcome back Bishop Cozzens this coming Wednesday, as he is the principal celebrant at our school Mass. Join us if you can. Also, take some time to look at the very dear comments on the gathering space wall which our students made about why they love St. Bernard's School. "We get to worship Jesus!" "We get to learn about God!" "We have a great culture!" and... "The food is great!"

Please take some time to read the letter which I have inserted this weekend regarding our school. After many months of consultation within and without the parish, we have decided to expand our school to include 6th grade this Fall (2024), with the plan to add 7th grade (2025) and 8th grade (2026). You will see where it fits into the current building plan and the strategic plan of the school, as well as the upcoming national advisory council which will gather as we turn the corner into the next 100 years of Catholic education in Thief River Falls.

The school has had steady growth over the past 5 years, and we plan to continue that steady growth to capacity. As I mentioned last week when I gathered with parents within the parish, our school exists first and foremost for our parishioners. If all of our parishioners sent their children to the school, we would need a waitlist just for us! I understand that not everyone will choose to send their children to St. Bernard's. That being said, I think some people don't come because they think it's too expensive. We work with every family to make it work, no matter what they are able to contribute. We also have scholarships available to assist with tuition costs. Right now, about 35% of our students come from the greater community. We welcome all, of course, but my simple point is this: We exist first of all for us – and I say that with a big smile!

LITURGICAL ITEMS

Chalice Items: The Paten

Patens are round plates made of precious metal which hold the bread to be consecrated at Mass. The main paten is a small convex plate which is placed on top of the chalice during the preparation for Mass. It holds a single large host called the "presider host," which is the host which the priests holds during the prayer of consecration and elevates (holds up and shows to the faithful).

On Sundays and other large Masses, additional larger patens with higher edges are also used, which are able to hold enough hosts for all of the faithful who are going to communicate (receive Holy Communion).

Like all sacred vessels there is symbolism behind the paten. Because the Body of the Lord rests in the paten after the consecration, it is representative both of the manger and the Holy Sepulchre (the tomb of Christ) since Christ's body was laid in both.

Finally, the paten is consecrated and set aside solely for the purpose of holding the hosts and should never be used for any other purpose (in the same way the chalice should never be used for any other purpose than containing the wine and the Blood of Christ).



Dear Parishioners,

I am very encouraged as we near the completion of the current phase of our building project. We've needed to find a way to make our site more accessible and more controlled. The expanded entrance provides accessibility through street-level access, a larger elevator, interior steps, and 24/7 access to the adoration chapel. It provides for greater security when we have parish events and school events occurring at the same time, and in further phases will accomplish a very clear and welcoming common access point with greater security for the buildings.

When I was assigned to St. Bernard's in early 2023, I was given a copy of the building plans. I was very impressed with the project and looked forward to joining the project. I have been brought up to speed regarding the beginnings of the various ideas and the time it has taken to bring them to fruition. I have also become aware that not everyone carries the same ideas regarding the overall vision. I want to be attentive to those various opinions, but this letter is to communicate what the current vision is, so that we have clarity and common understanding.

The full building plan, as I received it, is what we are pursuing. We are finishing the first phase of creating a centralized, secure, and accessible entrance on which the rest of the plan depends. We needed a larger entrance to create the ability to have a central access point which could connect to the church, the school, the parish and school offices, and the rest of the buildings with security and control.

Phase 1A is coming to completion and the project will continue toward the south. The next phase includes the construction of an integrated parish and school office space, with meeting rooms and controlled entrance to the school. Further to the south, in the next (final) phase, is the construction of a multi-use gymnasium and fellowship hall, kitchen, as well as expanded early learning center for K, Pre-K, Pre-School, and childcare.

These are the plans I received as the overall building project, and that is what we are pursuing over the next number of years. Some of these items are more pressing than others. As an example, our current use of the city auditorium for our school students is coming to an end. We need a gym. To build the gym, we first need to build the integrated parish and school office space. Also, prior to building the gym, we need to establish a rectory in a new location, since I need a place to live. My natural desire would have been to reside on-site, but I came here knowing that I'd need to be part of a community making sacrifices small and large as we continue into a bright future. Each phase carries decisions for future phases. All of that is to say, I'm glad that we've come this far, but we must continue – it's a good full plan, and we need it!

In the midst of this, we have now made a significant decision. We are expanding our education to 6th grade this coming fall (2024). Our intention is to have 7th grade in 2025 and 8th grade in 2026. It may seem to some that this is veering away from our plan, or coming as a surprise, and so I'd like to explain how we've come to this decision. The school used to have these middle school grades. It's been in the school's strategic plan to expand again to middle school within the next number of years. Our school families are asking for expanded school opportunities, both in the earlier ages (daycare/Preschool/PreK) as well into the middle school years. When I have visited with Bishop Cozzens about our school, he has clearly stated that we ought to pursue growth and expansion as we can, since Catholic education, Christian values, faith-based principles, and a Biblical worldview is a bright light in the midst of a mostly post-Christian society.

As I've been learning about our building project, a second story which would function as a middle school (above the offices) was in an early rendering. It was removed since there wasn't full commitment to whether the middle school would be pursued. I've asked the architects about this, and they have the first story plans prepared to hold a second story in the future. Of course, adding the second story in the future is much costlier than adding the second story at the time of original construction. So, the school is experiencing steady growth, it has a middle school in its own plan, we are pursuing construction, the bishop has encouraged growth and expansion – do we build a single story or a double story?

Through consultation within the parish – pastoral council, finance council, school advisory council, school parents – and external consultation with the Diocese, Catholic Schools Center of Excellence, and local business leaders who have an interest in expanded private school and child-care offerings in the community, I have come to the conclusion that building the second story in the upcoming phase rather than trying to add it on later is smarter long-term planning. Along with that, demonstrating commitment to the expansion to middle school, rather than leaving it in an undetermined future, provides clarity about where we are going. The next phases of the building project and the middle school expansion support and enhance each other's objectives in many ways. The parish gains its hoped-for outcomes. The larger community's desire for expanded private / Catholic education will bring external funds to support the project.

This Spring, we will plan for a National Advisory Council similar to what Sacred Heart in East Grand Forks did in 2013. They brought together alumni, stakeholders, wise and successful business people, parishioners, and staff to create a strategic plan for the future of the school in the realms of: 1) marketing, enrollment and retention; 2) Catholic identity; 3) academic excellence; 4) endowment and tuition. Sacred Heart has had tremendous growth from the clear vision set forth at that time. This Fall, we will have 6th grade in our current facilities. At the same time, the National Advisory Council will set the vision to navigate the full implementation of 7th and 8th grades in subsequent years.

I am confident that strong and clear leadership, assisted by broad and wise consultation, will amount to a very bright future for St. Bernard's Church and School. I can't help but think about our school's 100th anniversary coming up in 2025. Those pioneering parishioners, at great personal cost, knew that they were going to provide Catholic education to their children. And we are the great beneficiaries of their investment. We honor them, our history, our present, and our future by boldly entering the next 100 years of Catholic education in Thief River Falls.




Paintings in the Cathedral of Alatri which illustrate the various phases of the miracle






sorceress who ordered her to steal a consecrated Host to make a love potion. During Mass, the young woman hid a Host in a cloth. But when she got home, she realized that the Host had been transformed into bleeding flesh. This miracle has extensive documentation, including from Pope Gregory IX.

Monstrance where the reliquary of the miracle is kept



he most authoritative testimony regarding this miracle is found in the Bull Fraternitas tuae (March 13, 1228) written by Pope Gregory IX in response to Bishop Giovanni V of Alatri. The text reads: "Gregory, Bishop and Servant of the Servants of God, to Venerable Brother Bishop of Alatri, greetings and Apostolic

revealed this to you, you desire our opinion regarding the punishment that should be imposed upon them. First, we give thanks with all our strength to Him Who, though He always operates in marvelous ways, in this case repeats miracles and produces new wonders so that He calls to sinners, converts evildoers and confounds heretics while strengthening faith in the truth of the Catholic Church, sustaining hope and reigniting charity.

who with her perversion pushed the young woman to commit sacrilege, apply those disciplinary measures that we believe opportune to leave to your judgment. She should also visit the nearest bishop so that she can humbly confess her crime, imploring pardon with devout submission." The Pope interpreted this episode as a sign against the widespread heresies regarding the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist and pardoned the two repentant women. A commemorative medal was coined on the 750th anniversary of the miracle; one side showed the cathedral façade and the reliquary, while the other a bust of Pope Gregory IX with the Papal Bull.

blessing. We have received your letter, dearest brother, in which you informed us of a certain young woman misguided by an evil woman, who, after having received from the priest the Most Holy Body of Christ, held the Sacred Host in her mouth until the right moment to conceal the Holy Eucharist in a cloth. After three days, she discovered the same Body which she had received in the form of bread transformed into flesh, as everyone has been able to verify with their own eyes. Thus, dearest brother, by means of this apostolic letter, we dispose that you inflict a milder punishment on the young woman, whom we hold to have done this more from weakness than malice, especially because it can be believed that she has sufficiently repented in confessing her sin. 
